SRBC TO MEET, HONOR FORMER SENATOR NOAH WENGER, ACT ON AGRICULTURAL CONSUMPTIVE USE MATTERS, ACT ON WATER WITHDRAWAL AND USE APPLICATIONS, REVISE AQUIFER TESTING GUIDANCE

WHAT: The Susquehanna River Basin Commission (SRBC) will hold its regular quarterly business meeting, which is open to the public. SRBC will honor former state Senator Noah Wenger for his commitment to agriculture and for protecting the water resources of the Susquehanna basin, review current hydrologic conditions, act on final rulemaking for agricultural consumptive water use, act on revised aquifer testing guidance, act on revised project fee schedule, take enforcement actions, hear request for Administrative Hearing on SRBC's approval of the Susquehanna Steam Electric Station, and take action on eight water withdrawal and consumptive use applications.

SRBC: The Susquehanna River Basin Commission is the governing agency established under a 100-year compact signed on December 24, 1970 by the federal government and the states of New York, Pennsylvania and Maryland to protect and wisely manage the water resources of the Susquehanna River Basin. The Susquehanna River starts in Cooperstown, N.Y., and flows 444 miles to Havre de Grace, Md., where the river meets the Chesapeake Bay.
