SRBC TO MEET, REPORT ON HYDROLOGIC CONDITIONS, ACT ON CONSUMPTIVE USE MITIGATION PLAN AND 2008 WATER RESOURCES PROGRAM, ACT ON 16 WATER WITHDRAWAL AND USE APPLICATIONS

WHAT: The Susquehanna River Basin Commission (SRBC) will hold its regular quarterly business meeting, which is open to the public. SRBC will: review current hydrologic conditions throughout the Susquehanna River Basin; authorize the release of proposed consumptive use fee increase; act on Consumptive Use Mitigation Plan; act on 2008 Water Resources Program; hear request for Administrative Hearing on SRBC's approval of consumptive use for Mountainview Thoroughbred Racing Association, Inc., East Hanover Township, Dauphin County; act on 16 water withdrawal and consumptive use applications and request for out-of-basin diversion to Delaware and Great Lakes basins.
